- Rafael and his upward-bound classmates aim to be the first in their families to attend college. Caleb and his younger siblings are educated at home. Pulling on waders to collect aquatic insects exposes them to field science. Identifying the collected samples gives them laboratory experience.

- Rosemary is an active senior who volunteers at our recycling events. She and her fellow crafters use recycled

yarn and fabric to knit and quilt; much of their work is donated to local families.

- Jeffrey is a survivor of pediatric cancer who didn't let ongoing physical challenges prevent him from earning a Master's degree in water policy. Jethro is a differently-abled adult with a passion for bicycle commuting. Both have found ways to give back to our community through our programs.

Partnerships for Water Quality

With help from MiCorps grants, we expanded our more than decade-long stream monitoring and water quality reporting program. We collect aquatic insects and other small creatures that help us develop stream scores at each monitoring site.

Data from our program is used to support the Red Cedar Watershed Management Plan and develop a local ECOscore.

Volunteerism for Sustainable Land Use

Lake Investigation in Michigan and Nature Observation (LIMNO) is our partnership with educators at Michigan State University and Okemos High School. Together, we are delivering hands-on water science training for citizen-scientists like Rafael and his fellow students in Upward Bound. Programs for various grade levels are being developed, along with a community program to raise awareness of best practices for water quality.



Teaming with local governments, neighborhood organizations, and volunteers, we used low impact design (LID) principles to transform the unkempt grassy center of a roundabout into a functional rain garden. We planted native species, preferred for their deep root systems. These practices will reduce stormwater runoff at a busy "gateway" intersection. Working in the framework of the Great Lakes Clean Communities Network, our goal is to create a blueprint that residents, neighborhoods, and other coalitions can recreate in their communities.



Mid-MEAC's Smart Commute challenge has involved thousands of area residents in an exploration of multi-modal transportation options. As many as 500 annual participants log thousands of miles over ten days (two work-weeks.) Smart Commute, because of its duration, produces a lasting impact on individual behavior. Employers can help by encouraging commuting that reduces traffic emissions, like ride-matching and allowing tele-commuting.

With help from the Tri-County Bicycling Association and League of Michigan Bicyclists, we provide secure bike parking at popular community events, encouraging people to leave their cars at home.

Working with regional recycling leaders, we have reclaimed and repurposed many tons of unwanted materials. Michigan State University collects books and bikes; a pharmacist is on hand to make sure unwanted medications are properly handled. Fabrics go to groups that include Rosemary and her friends, who use clean materials to make the quilts they donate.

We worked with the Ingham Conservation District to assemble a volunteer team that removed thousands of pounds of debris and recyclables from the Grand River.





Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Math (STEAM) for Environmental Stewardship

Mid-MEAC is working with the Ingham County Drain Commissioner's Office to engage citizens in discussions about Low Impact Design (LID) for infrastructure and economic development. Two of our newest initiatives are built around a placemaking project on and near the Montgomery Drain on Lansing's east side. Our goal is to raise funds and involve partners in programs that will bring the community to a unique naturalized area.

Education in the Wild

Educational signage will be placed in the reclaimed naturalized area. Mid-MEAC will work with the Drain Commissioner to develop on-site educational programs for K-12 school groups.

Michigan State University students in environmental science, natural resources, and other degree programs can be involved in ways that lead to replicating this landmark project throughout the country.



We are raising funds to place sculptures, murals, and other forms of art near Low Impact Design (LID) features and educational signage. Our goal is to demonstrate that water resource protection, responsible land use, art, and economic development can be combined to benefit our whole community.

Each art placement is an opportunity to celebrate the environment. We are working with community leaders toward a fundraising goal of \$10 million.

Our education partners include Michigan State University, Lansing Community College, and educators from area high schools. We work with transportation engineers, city planners, and private-sector professionals to deliver environmental education.
